Labour Market Information

Here are some interesting facts about 3 different industries. This information is taken from Labour Market Information (LMI).

Whilst these sectors relate very well, there are many more industries where your knowledge and skills learned from Health & Wellbeing will be extremely useful. Can you think of any? Look out for some more interesting facts covered in the other Curriculum Packs.



Financial & Business Services

Scotland's thriving financial services community is made up of over 2000 financial service businesses. Edinburgh, Midlothian and East Lothian employ almost half of all people employed within this sector!

Scotland is one of Europe's leading financial centres & internationally recognised as the UK'S Largest outside of London.



Health Care

This sector encompasses hospital, dental, medical and human health activities. Employing 246,900 people in Scotland. This includes nurses, nursing auxiliaries, care work & home carers.

Between 2023 & 2030, this workforce is expected to grow by 5%.



Public Sector

This sector includes defense, public administration, compulsory social security, education, human health & social work activities. The Care Personal Services & Health Professional occupations account for 35% of those employed under this sector.

With 136,500 employed within this sector in Edinburgh, Care, Health, Teaching and Research were listed as the top employing occupations.
